


## Geography: Y2 Autumn Term - Out of Africa

### Key Vocabulary

Continent	A large area of land with several countries.
Country	A land lived in by people run by a government.
Ocean	Huge body of salt water.
City	A place in which people live and work. It is larger than a town.
Capital City	There is capital city in every country, where the leaders work and make decisions.
Climate	The typical weather conditions.
River	Large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea, lake or another river.
Mountain	A landform that rises high above its surroundings.

### Overview

In this topic we will be finding out about the similarities and differences between England and Kenya, thinking about their geographical features. We will be finding out what a continent is and locating the seven continents and five oceans on a world map. We will also be using maps and atlases to locate the United Kingdom and its countries. We will be comparing the climate of England with the climate of Kenya, using key geographical vocabulary. We will be exploring key facts about England and Kenya, including their capital cities, languages and population. Through the topic, we will be finding out about the physical differences between England and Kenya in relation to mountains, beaches and rivers. As part of this topic, we will also be comparing and contrasting the human geographical features such as the houses and the animals. The children will be exploring famous sports people from England and Kenya.
